

Find Spanish-language content

1. Search by keyword for the topic that you're seeking


- 2. Click on "All filters"
- 3. Scroll to "Language" and choose "Spanish"
- 4. Should probably also limit to full text! (see yellow highlight for two ways to do it)
- 5. Could limit by **source type** (e.ge. book chapters, magazines, scholarly). See purple.



Change database interface to Spanish

This will **change the labels (like "save"** and "Search") but doesn't change the language of the article(s)/content.


- 1. Click on MyEBSCO
- 2. Choose My preferences
- 3. Change language
- 4. Click Save button



Other EBSCO features

Translate


From an .html article, use the translate button and choose desired language.

- 1. Do a keyword search for the topic that you're seeking
- 2. Limit by language
- 3. Choose Spanish; Castilian



Primary sources

- Repeat steps 1-3 as above.
- Then, scroll to the top of the limit column and look at "Primary source content"

Reminder: The **"Academic content"** is the traditional JSTOR (journal) scholarly article content!
